The City of Henderson Parks and Recreation Department has been accredited through the Commission for Accreditation Parks and Recreation Agencies for over 20 years and is a two-time National Gold Medal Award recipient. Henderson is committed to providing residents with a variety of diverse and inclusive programs classes and events. These programs are hosted at 70 neighborhood and community parks, seven aquatic facilities and eight recreation centers, including two centers for adults 50 and over.

Henderson has 3,995 acres of award-winning parks and open space, over 200 miles of hiking trails, and is home to a variety of special facilities such as a Henderson Bird Viewing Preserve, Water Street Plaza, Whitney Mesa Nature Preserve, BMX tracks, sports complexes and an equestrian park. Recreation programs incorporating all ages, individuals with disabilities, and many cultural and demographic groups, reach participants throughout Southern Nevada.

Strong strategic planning has provided 73% of Henderson residents access within a 10-minute walk to a park or trail. All parks are maintained at the same high-quality standards regardless

of location or infrastructure age. Additionally, environmental stewardship is at the forefront of programming and future development, ensuring responsible water use during unprecedented drought conditions. Founded in 1968, Plano Parks and Recreation enriches Plano by providing inviting spaces, caring service, outstanding value, and memorable experiences. Nationally accredited since 1994, Plano Parks and Recreation has been ranked #1 in Texas since 2015 by The Trust for Public Land. A four-time winner of the National Gold Medal Award in Parks and Recreation Excellence, the Department delivers quality of life services to people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities

through a robust system of parks, trails, recreation programs and facilities.

The Department is an active participant in health and wellness initiatives and partnerships benefiting the community at-large. Roseville Parks, Recreation & Libraries (PRL) is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life for the residents of Roseville, California. Recently surpassing 150,000 residents, Roseville is one of the fastest growing cities in the nation. PRL's commitment to providing accessible green space is demonstrated by 84% of residents having a park within a 10-minute walk. Eighty-one parks cater to various interests and ages, and PRL preserves nearly 4,000 acres of open space for exploration and recreation. Those wanting to stay fit and active can visit PRL's fitness center, enjoy its two golf courses, or cool off in one of three swimming pools, while the community center serves as a hub for social gatherings and community events.

Thousands of school-aged children learn, recreate, and are cared for each day at 19 Adventure Clubs. PRL's diverse programs and events

engage residents of all ages, attracting more than 1.5 million program participants and facility visitors annually. Learning is supported and encouraged at the department's three libraries, offering a variety of resources and educational opportunities. The Native American museum and historic site offer a glimpse into the region's past, honoring and celebrating its significance. Embracing progress and future development, PRL's Strategic Master Plan guides its efforts. Exciting upcoming projects include the opening of a regional soccer complex and 10 new parks in the next two years. Thanks to dedicated staff, strong City leadership, and a supportive community, PRL is honored to be a National Gold Medal Award Finalist for the second year in a row.



South Suburban Park and Recreation District

Littleton, Colorado

South Suburban Park and Recreation District excels at its mission of fostering healthy living through stewardship of the environment, parks, trails, and open space and by providing top-notch recreation services and programs. As a unique CAPRA-accredited, special district, the organization serves more than 150,000 residents across three counties and six cities. Collaboration is the key to the management of South Suburban's resources as it joins forces with municipal, private, and public organizations to provide 98% of its residents with recreation opportunities within .5 miles of their home.

The District earned more than \$4.8 million in grants for improvements to more than 40 of its 92 parks. Community-driven decision-making

is a priority as South Suburban embarks on new trends, including an eSports Lounge, renovated Pilates reformer room, and new pickleball facilities. Public input is a focus as staff gathered information from 15 events and more than 2,000 surveys to complete the 2022 Master Plan, which will guide the District for the next five years. In keeping up with an expanding population, planning is underway for an 80-acre regional park and facilities to serve 20,000 new residents.

South Suburban is already one of the largest providers of senior programming, serving nearly



9,000 insurance-benefit plan members. The organization's offerings expand outside traditional agencies, including a hotel, food pantry, botanical gardens and entertainment center. Innovative ideas, such as an old ice arena repurposed into a temporary tennis facility, and a board room reimagined into a private hockey school, exemplify impactful revenue-driven partnerships.

Representing the heart and innovative spirit of downstate Illinois is Champaign Park District. Champaign is the 3rd fastest growing community in Illinois and is home to a diverse population of nearly 90,000 residents. Champaign Park District manages 62 parks, over 700 acres of green space, and 15 facilities that bring the community together for unique recreational opportunities. Over 1,400 programs and special events each year create unforgettable moments for individuals of all ages and backgrounds. Champaign Park

District consistently finds new ways to increase access to recreation. Champaign Parks Foundation distributed over \$120,000 in scholarship funds providing equal access to swim lessons, day camps, and special recreation. In the last three years, nearly 3 million dollars in grant funding has supported cultural arts programs, trails expansion, ADA improvements, and historic site upkeep.

Champaign Park District is an environmental steward – finding new ways to connect the community with nature and increase sustainable practices. Protection of our natural resources is a priority focus in New Braunfels. Conservation projects include protecting the fragile Comal Springs and endangered species, restoring over 30 acres of endangered Blackland prairie,

Staff hold forty-one unique certifications. Employee development plans assist employees achieve desired goals. In three years, thirteen staff were internally promoted, and three employees promoted to positions externally. Our department engages when the community needs it most including the pandemic (providing outdoor, virtual, and modified fitness and childcare programs) to the great winter storm of 2021 (assisting with warming centers and water distributions). As our founders discovered and we still know today. . . in New Braunfels ist das leben schon (the living is good)!

Plainfield Park District

Plainfield, Illinois

The Plainfield Park District has actively been serving its 110,000 residents since 1966. Located in the southwest suburbs Chicago, it is the ninth largest park district in the State of Illinois, covering more than 43 square miles between a multitude of municipalities including Plainfield as well as parts of Joliet, Romeoville, Crest Hill and Bolingbrook. The District incorporates a variety of open space and amenities. Through its 20-plus miles of regional water trails and multi-use pathways, 90 park sites over 1,500-plus acres, and 10,000-plus programs, the District provides recreational opportunities for the entire community, from toddlers to active adults.

The Plainfield Park District strives to serve its constituency by adhering to its core values as its operating pillars. The values of Community, Fiscal Responsibility, Stewardship of Natural Resources,

Health & Wellness, and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion are evident throughout the District but shine especially bright with the 2019 construction of the Prairie Activity & Recreation Center. The 40,000-square-foot, NetZero-designed facility achieved Passive House certification in 2019, meaning it creates as much energy as it uses. The District has taken an innovative, diverse and inclusive approach to recreation and preservation to enhance the lives of a rapidly-growing, every-changing populace. Responding to a common theme from surveys, the District established the Welcome Everyone platform, featuring free events that unite and welcome thousands of participants of varying ages, races, abilities and genders. District has been recognized nationally, state-wide, and locally, but our greatest recognition comes daily from those we serve.

Waukegan Park District

Waukegan, Illinois

The Waukegan Park District manages 53 properties and more than 742 acres of land, while providing outstanding creative and innovative programming. The District is committed to providing parks, facilities and recreation opportunities to the culturally diverse population of nearly 90,000 residents. There are a variety of experiences supporting health and wellness, equity, and conservation education. Programs and services are provided to all abilities and information is in English and Spanish to reach the diverse population. Hundreds of low-cost programs are offered and more than 30% of programming is free. An average of \$33,000 in scholarships is given annually to families in need, breaking down barriers and allowing access for all.

The indoor fitness facility provides the community

with free indoor walking to improve health, and there are numerous paved walking paths incorporated into park renovations along with accessible playground equipment. Nature education is integrated into programming to promote conservation education. The staff and community are involved in the planning process through public input meetings, committees, surveys, and social media engagement. Continuous improvements to parks, facilities, and programs are ensured through accountability to deliver outstanding parks and services for our community. These efforts have been recognized nationally and statewide by the NRPA Commission for Accreditation of Park and



Recreation Agencies, Government Finance Officers Association, Illinois Association of Museums and Illinois agency accreditation (IAPD/IPRA). Through leadership, community involvement and dedicated staff, the Waukegan Park District has been serving its residents in innovative ways for more than 100 years, with more to come!

Bristol Parks, Recreation, Youth and Community Services Bristol, Connecticut



Bristol Parks, Recreation, Youth and Community Services (BPRYCS) is the 2nd largest municipal park system in Connecticut and one of the top ten largest municipal park systems in New England. Rated as the #1 thing residents love about Bristol, the department oversees 730 acres of urban parks, hundreds of recreational programs, three aquatics facilities, counseling and case management for youth and community members, a federal drug free communities program, and a community theater. The organization has evolved from a

traditional parks department to a comprehensive full-service agency that impacts every aspect of how people live, play, and work in the City of Bristol. The integration of youth and community services has fostered service alignments that have increased access to resources, while a new arts and culture division has resulted in public art installations and the development of a cultural district. BPRYCS is known nationally for its innovative and award-winning programs and facilities, which continue to expand access to recreation and advance social equity.

The department is committed to engaging in diversity, equity, and inclusion work to fully

deliver high-quality services and facilities that enhance the community's quality of life, meet the diverse needs of all citizens, and build a sustainable future. For close to a century, the Bristol Parks, Recreation, Youth and Community Services Department has served as an essential department impacting the lives of all Bristol residents by shaping positive public perceptions, fostering cultural unity, creating responsible and healthy citizens, and inspiring advocacy.



Douglasville Parks and Recreation Douglasville, Georgia

Located 30 miles west of Atlanta, Douglasville is a vibrant community to live, grow, and thrive. Douglasville Parks and Recreation Department (DPRD) commitment to our community aligns with the National Recreation and Park Association's three pillars.

Led by our social equity plan, our environmental sustainability strategy, and our healthy futures initiative, these focus areas drive our pledge to

provide equitable opportunities for our residents. Serving as one of the thirteen CAPRA accredited agencies in Georgia, DPRD offers over 100 programs and events catered to ALL. Through our "Impact That Matter" campaign, we have

invested \$27 million dollars in historically under served communities. This includes building a new gymnasium, senior center, football stadium and 5,000 sq ft zero entry swimming pool. Recognizing inclusion has no boundaries, we have provided over \$15,000 to families through our "Dare 2 Play" Scholarship Program. This initiative allows youth the opportunity to participate in any one of our programs regardless of financial hardship.

Through intentional planning we were able to complete 90% of the recommendations outlined in the Parks & Recreation Master Plan, focusing on parks and facilities, staffing, and program operations. Our mission is to plan for inclusion, build with intention, and care for all.

Hoffman Estates Park District

Hoffman Estates, Illinois

The Hoffman Estates Park District (HEParks) is an award-winning Illinois agency. A previous National Gold Medal Award winner and 2022 finalist, we are CAPRA accredited twice and have recently earned a third perfect score from our evaluation team. Our Agency prides itself on “making life fun”! We have two recreation/fitness centers with gymnasiums, programming space and DCFS certified childcare. Our Triphahn Center has two standard NHL size ice rinks and is the official practice facility of the Chicago Wolves.

The Club, our 100,000+ square foot fitness center, has an indoor activity pool and lap pool, and with three full-size basketball courts, is the official practice facility of the Windy City Bulls. Our 18-hole Bridges of Poplar Creek golf course includes a state of the art ten-bay heated Toptracer range and simulator, the first in our area, providing

year-round golf. We continually offer new programs, and last year introduced 46 new offerings with a 74% success rate. Our 88 parks are colorful with imaginative ways to play; from nature to ninja warrior courses, these are not your conventional playgrounds! We do more with less reliance on taxes, with innovative personnel and alternative revenues, including grants, we have one of the lowest tax to total expense ratios in Illinois for an agency our size. HEParks supports NRPA's three pillars, ensuring open access to parks, facilities, and 14 miles of walking/biking trails. Our wide selection of programs and amenities allows us to deliver our mission, “providing the best in park and recreation services.”



Park District of Oak Park

Oak Park, Illinois

Established in 1912, the Park District of Oak Park has a long history of developing green space and offering recreational opportunities for our residents. Oak Park is located immediately west of Chicago and encompasses just 3.5 miles N/S and 1.5 miles E/W. We serve 53,000+ residents with only 84 acres of land. Thus, staff must be creative when offering our 3,000+ programs and maintaining our spaces.

The District is proud that our sustainability commitment aligns with the expectations of our residents. We implement best practices through construction of LEED, Net Zero, and Passive House designs for our facilities as well as the installation of bio-swales, solar arrays, rain-harvesting, geo-thermal, and other strategies to preserve energy and help protect mother earth.

We also have our own Conservatory where staff grow native perennials and annuals that are planted in our parks, and we do not use any herbicides or pesticides on our green spaces including sport fields.

Reaching under-resourced and under-served residents is a priority for PDOP. We have expanded our financial assistance offerings to serve more families in need. The Community Recreation Center offers free after-school programs for grades 6-12 as well as free access to the indoor walking track for all residents. Finally, our DEI Committee focuses on diversifying engagement efforts through partnerships to help us reach



new audiences for PDOP involvement, we built inclusive restrooms and locker rooms in our CRC, and we published a language guide to assist staff. We strive for inclusion of all.

In the last few years, CPRST has fulfilled many of the needs of the people who live, work and play in the Cullman area while continuing to look for more ways to enhance the quality of life in Cullman.

and a strong network of volunteers and partnerships, the department's progression has been exponential.

We received an innovation grant from OPRA and partnered with NOPEC to complete

2 ballfield LED light installations through a \$90,000 grant. We continue demonstrating creative solutions to fulfill the needs within our department by introducing two full-time positions, increasing wages, and offering free membership for staff. We also address needs within our community by re-purposing facility space, infrastructure improvements, and establishing new field space. Since 2020, we have completed

While the City of Macedonia has a population of only 12,000, the Parks and Recreation Department is robust both in park space and offerings. Our 350+ acres of land hosts more than 25,000 people over the course of 9 events, over 2,700 participants in 34 programs, and nearly 125,000 visits to our Recreation Center annually. Our programs have seen record-high participation, launching our department to new heights. As a result of extensive planning, a culture of leadership,

\$750,000 of department improvements, we have added a new dock, fitness turf, facility LED lighting, and new fitness equipment to better serve our community. Through our 5 year-strategic plan, another \$4.8 million is planned through 2027, with a focus on program and facility expansion. Through the execution of our values of excellence in community, sustainability, and service, we continue adapting to the evolving needs within our community, and planning for what's to come, while pushing sustainable efforts to leverage resources to maximize our impact for the future.

Oak Brook Park District

Oak Brook, Illinois

The Oak Brook Park District (OBPD) was founded in 1962 with a mission to provide the very best in parks and recreational opportunities, facilities, and open lands for our community. Today, this CAPRA-accredited agency serves an aging residential population of about 8,000 and over 100,000 corporate residents. The OBPD's 10-Year Master Vision has directed the prioritization of capital improvements within the 173.4 acres of property we own and maintain, 40 of which are dedicated to preserving the Dean Nature Sanctuary. The OBPD also owns and maintains Central Park. This park is home to the Family Recreation Center, an aquatic center, and our award-winning Oak Brook Tennis Center. The most recent additions to Central Park include the acquisition of 34 acres of land, currently under construction, the Sandlot, a completely accessible playground, and the

Winter Lights at Central Park, an illumination created during the pandemic, which brought more than 90,000 visitors over the past three years.

Our award-winning preschool provides a responsive educational experience that welcomes children with special needs to learn alongside their peers. The OBPD has established the nation's first certified deep water running class to better meet the needs of those with limited mobility, and the annual Pink 5k has generated over \$130,000 to provide free mammograms to uninsured women in surrounding communities. From innovative programming to state-of-the-art facilities, over 225 staff work



passionately to create opportunities that help our community feel the very best and be the very best."

Sycamore Park District

Sycamore, Illinois

This year the Sycamore Park District celebrates its 100th anniversary and the Board and staff are honored to be a National Gold Medal Award Finalist during this special time. In recent years, facilities and services have undergone a significant expansion to support a growing community of approximately 18,000 residents. As they move forward, the District leadership team is committed to setting a precedence of sustainability for the next 100 years.

In 2021, to guide responsible resource management and effective goal setting, the Board identified new mission and vision statements while also defining a set of core values: equity, transparency, sustainability, and connections.
